Across the School:

This week has seen us marking Children's Mental Health Week. The theme for this year was "My Voice Matters".

We hope you enjoy reading the tutor newsletters and have a restful half term.






Maths Matters:

In a certain city, houses have to be built in a particular way.


There have to be two rooms on the ground floor and all other rooms have to be built on top of these.

Then at 4:30pm, an hour-long dinosaur show is packed with 5 more dinosaurs, fun facts and interactive games.


Tickets are £8 and selling fast. 2 shows have already sold out!
