Middle School:

Mrs Cantello has been busy starting visits to new learners for September and has attended a conference this week, so Middle School has been in the safe hands of Mr Orchard for much of the week.

We began the week with an interesting assembly which explored the importance of Mathematics in everyday life, with a specific focus on jobs. The learners were tasked with identifying a job that does not utilise Maths skills (spoiler: they could not!). Our SMSC assemblies continued with our Mathematics focus.

Six of our Year 7 learners were very excited to begin their Mini Police sessions this Wednesday, with an exploration of police equipment and a police car. They are looking forward now to next week's session on riot shield training and radios.

We then ended the week today with an insightful look at the world of being an MP, with a visit and assembly from John Penrose, our local MP. The learners asked some interesting questions. This assembly acts as an introduction to a study of politics ahead of the general election this year, which will culminate in Westhaven learners undertaking their own vote.

Upper School:

Upper School commenced the week looking at how Maths is used in different jobs. Interesting discussions took place and we are all still trying to determine a job which does not include any element of Maths!

Whilst Year 11 and Year 13 learners were at college on Friday morning the rest of upper school had the opportunity to learn about the role of a MP and parliament from our local MP, John Penrose. This gave learners an overview of British politics and general elections. Learners asked some thought-provoking questions.

Year 11 Hair and Beauty learners enjoyed a trip to Weston College Hair and Beauty department. They had a tour of the department and were able to ask questions to staff and students.



Maths Matters:



Aunt Jane had been to a jumble sale and bought a whole lot of cups and saucers she's having many visitors these days and felt that she needed some more. You are

staying with her and when she arrives home you help her to unpack the cups and saucers.

There are four sets - a set of white, a set of red, a set of blue and a set of green. In each set there are four cups and four saucers. So, there are sixteen cups and sixteen saucers altogether.

Just for the fun of it you decide to mix them around a bit so that there are sixteen different-looking cup/saucer combinations laid out on the table in a very long line. So, for example:

- (a) There is a red cup on a green saucer, but not another the same, although there is a green cup on a red saucer.
- (b) There is a red cup on a red saucer, but that's the only one like it.

There are sixteen different cup/saucer combinations on the table and you think about arranging them in a big square. Because there are sixteen, you realise that there are going to be four rows with four in each row (or, if you like, four rows and four columns).

So here is the challenge to start off this investigation: Place these sixteen different combinations of cup/saucer in this four by four arrangement with the following rules:

- 1. In any row there must only be one cup of each colour.
- 2. In any row there must only be one saucer of each colour.
- 3. In any column there must only be one cup of each colour.
- 4. In any column there must only be one saucer of each colour.

Remember that these sixteen cups/saucers are all different, so, for example, you cannot have a red cup on a green saucer and another red cup on a green saucer somewhere else.




